General COVID 19 situation and its effect on education sector- Belize

- COVID-19 National Oversight Committee which is co-chaired by the Prime Minister and Leader of the Opposition was established.
- Effective Friday, March 20th School were closed. Online session for selected school started after the Easter break.
- Effective immediately, social gatherings were limited to 100 people and then eventually to 10 people.
- Restriction were first placed on travelers from selected county, eventually all traveler were prohibited, including Belizeans studying abroad.

General COVID 19 situation and its effect on education sector- Belize

- The national census was postponed until next year and some of the resources was allocated to collect data associated with COVID-19.
- The First case of COVID—19 in Belize was confirmed on March 23rd 2020.
- Total Belize had 18 cases of COVID-19. There were 2 deaths and 16 recoveries. To date Belize has no cases of COVID-19 for over 30 days

What are national data strategies regarding regular data collection?

- Data collection for Education is done through the Belize Education Management Information System (BEMIS)
- Data for the school year 2019-2020 are already collected.
- Promotion/ repeating of students for 2020-2021 school year will continue as schedule
- At the end of this school year it is expected that all pre-primary and primary school students will be promoted
- Secondary and Tertiary students will be promoted based on adjusted school policies.

Which education data collection activities have been affected?

- Primary School Examination (PSE) June 2020
- There will be no data available to monitor students performance in Mathematics, English A, Social Studies & Science at the end of Grade 8.
- Attendance (April, May, June)
- CSEC to some extent

 How are you planning on recording usual aggregate measures (students, teachers, schools closure or changes and learning from home with parents often taking up the role of educator)?

- There will be no changes in how we record students data, teachers data and school closures.
- Presently Pre-Primary and Primary school students are receiving daily lessons.
- Secondary and Tertiary School Students continue to be engaged online.
- There are no plans to record learning at home, especially at the pre-primary and primary level.

Developing new data to track and monitor COVID-19

- The Ministry of Health is responsible to monitor and report on the cases of COVID-19
- The SIB (Statistical Institute of Belize) conducted it first COVID-19 survey.
- Belize has not had any new confirmed cases of COVID-19 for the past 30 days
- Only 18 Cases were confirmed

Key issues and challenges

- Ensuring that students remain engaged and entertained without overwhelming them with too much
- Ensuring that students who do not have access to radio and television get copies of the paper-based lessons and assignments.
- Collecting data to determine school readiness for reopening
- Working out ways on how to get students on track once school reopens (especially at the primary level)
- Unexpected school closures or travel restrictions could impact data collection and verification exercises

Key issues and challenges

- Limited student access to technology (devices and Internet service)
- Low parent education levels (many parents unable to help their children learn)
- Planning with uncertainty (not knowing when schools will reopen or have to close again)

Suggestions for data production during such crisis

- Use online tools for data collection (e.g. Open EMIS on which BEMIS is based)
- Use telephone interviews for remote data verification where onsite verification is not possible
- Be flexible and patient with schools as they may have additional challenges related to providing education during the COVID-19 pandemic
