I. Introduction

The production and dissemination of quality education statistics is a core activity within the mandate of the UIS. As the custodian of the SDG 4 agenda, UIS must monitor progress towards the global education targets. As part of this process, and to facilitate the access to available information on education, a compilation of different types of households surveys has been created on the UIS website and made available to the public.

This article details the most relevant methodological aspects associated with the development of the inventory and is structured as follows: Section 2 sets out the objectives of the inventory, Section 3 contains instructions for its use, Section 4 describes the type of data to be displayed and Section 5 provides a summary of the coverage in terms of countries with available data.

II. The inventory

The inventory provides a compendium of links related to different types of household surveys carried out for each country. These surveys can be budget, labour force or multipurpose national surveys, DHS, LSMS or MICS international surveys and other national or international surveys. The inventory provides a brief overview of the number and names of the surveys per country and per year using a color scale.

In addition to the usual sources of information from the EMIS that countries submit, the UIS produces indicators using information from household surveys. This allows to fill data gaps for SDG indicators and their disaggregations that in some regions cannot be filled by administrative data. But in addition, as they are collected by a variety of organizations and countries, it presents challenges as they differ in terms of coverage, frequency and design. Nevertheless, the HHS are a powerful complement that, due to their cost and availability, should be taken into account in the process of producing educational indicators for the UIS.

The surveys listed in the inventory contain potentially useful information to achieve this goal. Many of these have been processed and incorporated into the UIS database but others are still in process. In this first stage, the purpose was to obtain a detailed list of the main household surveys of each country, and what is published in this inventory is a by-product of the whole process.

III. Using the inventory

To use the inventory, you can take three different paths:

- a) Browse freely through the inventory, without the need to use the regional grouping or date filters. To do this, you will have to scroll vertically until you find the country you are looking for. Once you have found it, you must locate the year and type of survey that you are looking for, move to the desired point and a pop-up window will appear with the name of the survey.
- b) Use the filters to select a region:
 - In the 'Region type' drop-down menu, select the regional grouping you are interested in: UN Economic and Social Commission, SDG regional group or World Bank income classification.
 - In the 'Region' drop-down menu, select the region of interest. All countries belonging to the selected region will be displayed.
 - The presence of a green box indicates the availability of a survey for that country, year and type of survey. The intensity of the color indicates the number of surveys available.
- c) Use the filters to select a country:
 - Scroll down and consult the 'Country' drop-down menu for further information about a specific country.
 - Select groups of surveys with the 'Type of survey' drop-down menu.
 - Data from specific types of surveys for a particular country will appear, along with links to their microdata (if available).

A step-by-step guide to navigate the dashboard with pictures is presented in Annex II.

IV. Data

a. Dates

Surveys for the years 2010 to 2022 have been taken into account. For those countries with a survey conducted between two calendar years, the year of the last calendar year was imputed. And if a survey was carried out more than once a year (e.g. quarterly, semi-annually), it is only counted as one for that year and if there are several sources of metadata, they are all displayed.

b. Sources

The information shown in the inventory refers to official surveys carried out by Ministries of Education, National Statistical Offices and international organizations (UNICEF, World Bank, among others).

The list of surveys and metadata was obtained from:

- Other inventories from partners such as IHSN Survey Catalog, the WB Microdata Library, the ILO Survey Catalogue, among others.
- A detailed research on the Internet on different national and international organizations.

c. Types of surveys

This collection covers household surveys. Administrative data from EMIS, census data or non-household surveys such as learning assessments were excluded from the inventory. In all cases, surveys are expected to contain educational data from the respondents to be considered as a valuable source of data for educational indicators.

For presentation purposes, the different surveys collected were classified into the following groups:

- National (Budget): includes household expenditure and/or budget surveys, as well
 as consumption surveys. Typically, the main objective of these surveys is to find out
 what items households spent their income on in a given period of time or what goods
 or services they have consumed.
- National (LFS): refers to surveys whose main purpose is to know the situation of the
 active labor force in a given country or region. It focuses on questions related to the
 active search for employment, employment status, its quality and its
 characterization.
- National (Multi-p.): these are surveys that serve multiple purposes. Frequently, the same survey provides countries with useful data for calculating indicators on living conditions, poverty and/or the labor market, although other purposes may be included. The information collected may include, for example, data on the composition of households, their income and other socio-demographic data on their members, such as educational and labor data.
- National (Other): includes all surveys carried out by a national agency that do not fall
 into any of the above categories. For example, surveys on health, youth, access to
 technology, among others, which also collect educational data on the population.
- International (DHS): includes surveys under the Demographic and Health Surveys Program. This is a USAID funded program that collects population, health and nutrition data for a wide range of developing countries.
- International (LSMS): includes household surveys from the Living Standards Measurement Study (LSMS) program conducted by the World Bank to strengthen

- household survey systems and improve the quality of microdata to better inform development policies.
- International (MICS): surveys belonging to the Multiple Indicator Cluster Surveys (MICS) program carried out by UNICEF are considered to obtain internationally comparable data on a variety of topics, but focusing mainly on those issues that directly affect the lives of children and women.
- International (Other): this includes the rest of the surveys that apply the same design in more than one country, at a regional or international level.

d. Regions

To assist users, the regional groupings used in the inventory are organised in the following order:

- UN Economic and Social Commission (EC Region);
- SDG regional group (SDG Region); or
- the World Bank income classification (WB Region)

In particular, the regional groupings consist of the following classification:

V. Coverage

In total, 2,212 household surveys were obtained for 224 countries (or territories). From the list of the 240 SDG countries the resulting coverage achieved is 93.3%. Below is the distribution of the countries with available information according to the different regional groupings considered.

Regarding the type of survey obtained, 1,765 (79.8%) are national and 447 (20.2%), international. In the first group, there are 1,011 national LFS, 442 multi-purpose, 234 budget surveys and 78 (4.4%) classified as other. Between the international surveys, 166 (37.1%) are MICS, 113 (25.3%) DHS, 17 (3.8%) LSMS and other 151 (33.8%) surveys. The HHS are distributed as follows:




Figure 2: Household surveys by year

Annex I: About the collection

The collection was conducted between February 2022 and September 2022 and consisted exclusively of online research. No contact was made with the organizations responsible for producing this information.

The inventory is not intended to be an exhaustive compilation of surveys. In case that a survey does not appear in the list for a specific country or year, this could mean that the information is not publicly available, that the country website was down at the time of collection, or that it was unintentionally overlooked.

Finally, because the links are hosted on its original websites and do not depend on UIS server, there is a possibility that some of them may be down without prior notice. Request for specific microdata should be directed to those organizations.

Annex II: Guide to navigating the inventory

The dashboard has two filters on the top: one for the regional grouping (EC Region, SDG Region, WB Region) and another for the specific regions of each classification.

Then there is the main part of the table, where for each country and year, the presence of a green box indicates the availability of a survey on each type of survey: National (Budget), National (LFS), National (Multi-p.), National (Other), International (DHS), International (LSMS), International (MICS) and International (Other). The intensity of the color indicates the number of surveys available.

Figure 4: Opening the 'Region Type' filter






Figure 5: Opening the 'Region' filter

At the bottom of the dashboard there is a section where you can access more information for a country of interest. There are two filters: one for countries and another one for the survey type.





Figure 8: Opening the 'Survey type' filter
